Parish Council, October

Public Forum A member of the public (MoP) is unhappy about the public footpath at Slipway Quay. This originally existed for foot passengers to embark on the cross-river ferry, but now allows foot access to the water and for embarkation on dinghies. However, it is not a public slipway. The MoP felt the 'Private' signs and flotsam rope overwhelmed the public footpath signage. PC will consider this outside the meeting and in a future agenda. The MoP congratulated the Footpaths Officer on footpath improvements.

Minutes Painting of the bus shelter at The Cross has been delayed by wet weather. The front barge board is plastic but Councillor Tagg will see if it can be changed to wood.

Planning There was extensive discussion on the proposed extension at 1 Barns Terrace, Elbridge. The County Council Planning Officer has refused permission, but the manner of the refusal was concerning. The Council felt its decisions were being ignored. As our County Councillor, Councillor Worth explained that there were many planning decisions which parishes could not influence. These included conservation areas, TPOs and a host of other matters that meant that Landulph has virtually no influence on the process. Councillors asked 'why do we bother, then'?

Climate WG (Working Group) Climate films instead of winter talks are planned for March 2025. Other plans include recording rarer wildlife sightings, investigating the legal aspects of car sharing and submitting Duke Orchard for a sustainability award.

Orchard WG The composting loo will be explained (...in far too much detail?) in a newsletter article.

Searle Family Field The working group visited the field - the pavilion is in a sorry state. Water meters were inspected - one showing an obvious leak. If this is the cricket club meter, it must be cut off the minute the cricket club's lease expires on 1 January. The English Cricket Board had been contacted, but is unlikely to be interested because of the state of the pavilion.

Governance & Finance WG The PC's financial position was reviewed and would stand at £24k if/when all grants were received. In response to a question from Councillor Ansell. it was

announced that the Under 5s move to the school would be financed by the Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) with funds going directly to the school.

Footpaths The Footpaths Officer, Gwen Morris, reported that Cormac had supplied a gate and fixings for the Penyoke path, and would now be asked for posts and hinges. These could be funded by the parish council if necessary. A step on the path had been repaired, and signs installed on 'Badger Alley'.

Parish Council Website Landulph's website host is currently a 'small player', but there is an alternative, a not-for-profit host called Parish Online which meets government standards. The government offers £100 towards re-hosting.

Phone box Handrails have been made and are being powder coated. **A38** The Tamar Crossings Public Enquiry had lasted one day, not the four expected. The Secretary of State's decision is expected in December. Works start on the tunnel this month. More trains will stop at Saltash to ease congestion, but not Cross-Country trains.

Landulph Parish Council Meeting, Nov 2024

Public Forum; Where are the horse riding signs? Councillor Worth confirmed these are on Cornwall Council Highways' to-do list. One

sign will go beside the 30mph sign at Wayton, but the questioner suggested they might be put at Long Orchard, at the top of Highdown and at the bridleway junction at Elbridge. Unfortunately, we only have 2 signs.

A householder from Hodders Way asked for the PC's support. He has a person-sized hole in his garden caused by a collapsed rainwater drain. Ownership of the drain was uncertain, but Councillor Worth assured the householder that it is also on Highways' to-do list. PC agreed to provide moral support and to hassle Highways.

Planning; Nothing....a short meeting beckoned! Then Councillor Ansell raised a letter from EDF about battery sites. This predicted design changes following updates in the technology. Councillor Worth suggested this was an opportunity to re-engage with the developers. **Orchard WG** (Working Group); Duke Orchard has been entered into

the 'Nature and Trees for Growth Sustainability Award'. WooWoo Loo is being used, is clean and is smell-free. The team are investigating purchase of a wildlife camera.

Searle Family Memorial Field; Working Groups's Terms of Reference approved. Councillor Gawith had finally made contact with Callington Cricket Club, whose lease ends at year end. No other club was likely to take over because of the state of the pavilion. Councillors were warned this would leave the council liable for future costs, which could be substantial.

Governance & Finance WG; PC need to identify projects for the next precept calculations. New playground equipment meant less maintenance work, so the maintenance budget was underspent; Transfer £1,000 to reserves.

Why the clerk is still using cheques. Action - contact Barclays to investigate BACS or on-line banking.

The County budget is now available for public consultation.

Footpaths; Footpaths Officer reported that additional posts had been provided for the 'Badger Alley' gate. The team would try to complete the upgrade before the parish walk after Christmas. She asked about possible vehicular access to transport materials. Councillor Braund (P) let on that he owns a hole digger, at which Councillor Tagg noticeably perked up.

Parish Council Website; Councillor Tagg reported that adopting a '.gov.uk' website was a good idea. These are trusted, secure and can't be sold! The £100 discount runs out at the end of the year, so she will approach potential suppliers for quotes. However, the parish newsletter (currently on the PC's website) would probably not be appropriate for a '.gov.uk' website, which needs discussing with the newsletter group. A '.gov.org' site might be suitable.

Landulph Memorial Hall; The LMH committee had asked for help. The chair is standing down and the committee is now very small. The PC cannot help directly, but LMH needs support from the local community. Your hall needs you!

Christmas (Bah humbug); £50 approved for a Christmas tree at Landulph Cross. Wine and mincies at the next meeting.

Landulph Festival 'best ever'

Another year of Festival activity is over, and we have been delighted to hear from appreciative supporters that they thought that this year's was the 'best ever', so thank you very much for that vote of confidence.

The performers brought evenings of the high quality which fully justified the Festival organisers' often expensive leaps of faith. It is interesting that performers from far and wide invariably comment on the warmth of their reception in Landulph and the enthusiasm of the audiences here.

The first weekend featured the return of the irrepressible Bertie Pearce, a comedian who performed magic, or should it be the other way round? Financed by



the Festival, he started his afternoon by performing for the children of Landulph School, proving very popular. Younger members of the evening audience also enjoyed their chance to appear on stage, and there was much hilarious audience participation in Bertie's world of magic and illusion.

The Sam Jewison Trio swapped Ronnie Scotts for the Memorial Hall on Saturday night. Playing the American songbook, these outstandingly talented young musicians dazzled the audience with their skill and engaging style. It was an exceptional evening and hopefully they will return to Landulph (see photo overpage) .

On Sunday evening the audience went canoeing through the North-West Passage with Mark Agnew, winner of the European Explorer of the Year 2023. He gave an informative and interesting account of his



adventures. In recognition of his own mental health issues prior to his journey, he nominated Mind UK as his preferred charity and so this year's Festival raffle raised over £400 for this worthwhile cause. Thank you to all who donated prizes and bought tickets.

The second weekend featured the Landulph version of Oktoberfest, with lederhosen, Bavarian pinafores and dirndls much in evidence as everyone present enjoyed a feast of German delicacies including bratwurst, rollmop herring and black forest gateau. Meanwhile the Druzba Klezmer band kept the audience entertained with Eastern European music.

By contrast, the Inn Theatre Company from Dartmouth gave a very

special and memorable performance of extracts from some of the betterknown scenes from Shakespeare's plays. They brought to life his Heroes. Villains and Lovers. including Romeo and Juliet, Othello, Hamlet, Titania and Bottom, much to the audience's delight. The classical concert this year also proved extremely popular. Pavel Ralev, a brilliant international guitarist, recommended by John Williams, kept us all entranced and totally





silent. His personality and performance were equally compelling. It was another exceptional evening, and another performer who I hope



will return before too long. Dalla Duo started off the final weekend with Neil Davey playing his bouzouki and Hilary Coleman clarinet. They performed a range of Cornish and original songs and told local anecdotes. In the interval the audience enjoyed Cornish pasties from Veg Box Fresh. Our final Festival event was a stunning performance by the Vox Beatles. It was great to see all the variations of wigs



and colourful outfits from different eras of the Fab Four. We all sang and danced to the Beatles' classics, perfectly played, and ended the Festival hoarse and totally exhausted, but everyone had a fab time. The paintings on display and for sale at the Art Exhibition throughout the Festival were, as usual, a mixture of all media, subjects and tastes; they attracted a lot of attention and many sales were made. Creative artwork by the Under Fives decorated the bar, and a vivid display in the Hall by classes from the School, were both eye-catching and educational.

Many thanks to those who organised and manned the exhibition, the artists who gave talks and those who provided cream teas at the weekends.

As always my thanks must go to the patrons and sponsors, and those who support us by attending all our events; Jason, our bar manager and his team, Hannah our resident mixologist, Debbie who takes amazing photographs, and Martin who provides a fully professional



sound and light service the quality of which amazes performers and delights the audience; and finally the Festival Committee who are always cheerful and accomplish miracles when required. We are already planning next year's programme. Your input is always appreciated and ideas for future events are welcome. The next 'Festival' production is the pantomime Peter Pan playing for two nights on Friday and Saturday 7 and 8 February. Kirsty Evans.



MIYAWAKI TINY FOREST

What is a Miyawaki or Tiny Forest? Planted in November of this year, our Miyawaki Forest is about 13m by 7m and is home to 15 different types of native trees, shrubs, and bushes.

Planting the 256 saplings close together (three or four per square metre), makes them grow much faster, jump starting the forest creation process. The leaf canopy is expected to fill in within three years, swiftly offering a potential habitat for over 500 animal and plant species. The Landulph Miyawaki Forest is sparking particular interest because historically this system has been used in the urban environment, but we aim to show that replicating natural forest regeneration processes can be of benefit to wildlife in the countryside too. Higher biodiversity has been recorded in Miyawaki forests than in neighbouring woodland, so within the context of the current climate change emergency and stark warnings about the global loss of biodiversity, being able to create diverse, healthy forests quickly could prove vital to meeting international targets and tackling these issues.

Miyawaki majors on the benefits of Tiny Forest for the community, in particular the involvement of children, both in the planting process and as an ongoing place of learning. We are delighted that every child in Landulph school has produced a plan for a square metre of the Forest – many beautifully illustrated and imaginatively laid out. We are thrilled at the

enthusiastic reception from the school, and a plan will display who planned which square. The importance of having space where the children can learn close by the Tiny Forest is stressed, hence the green open meeting space nearby in Duchess Green.

The Miyawaki Method is named after its creator, Akira Miyawaki, a Japanese botanist who has a PhD in plant ecology and a particular interest in phytosociology, i.e. how plant species interact with each other within communities. We are very grateful to Glyn Deacon and Steve Holman who have been doing extensive groundworks in Duchess Green, and to all who have been helping with planting trees, hedges and hundreds of bulbs, making benches and the Woo Woo Loo in Duke Orchard. Help is always needed in both Duchess Green and Duke Orchard, and our next LOG day is Sunday 8 December 12 – 3pm. Come along for as long or short a time as you can, and join in – tea and cake will be provided! For further information please see the Landulph Parish Council website: https://www.landulph.org.uk/.

Many thanks to Jo Butcher, Gaye Braund and their helpers for their innovative and tasty baking. It has been agreed that the occasional Friday morning recipe in the newsletter would be appreciated, so we begin with Jo's Tan Slices which she discovered in New Zealand.

Ingredients:

113g white sugar For the caramel

½ tsp vanilla essence 395g tin sweetened condensed milk

300g plain flour 100g butter 1tsp baking powder 2tbs golden syrup

100g chocolate chips 200g butter, softened

Preheat oven to 180°C/160°C fan.

Line a 23cm square tin with baking paper.

Cream butter and sugar until pale and fluffy. Beat in vanilla. Add flour and baking powder and mix until well combined (mixture will be quite crumbly).

Press two thirds of the mixture evenly into prepared tin. Pour over the caramel.

Mix the remaining base mixture with the chocolate chips and crumble over the caramel.

Bake slice for 20-25 minutes until pale golden and cooked through. Caramel: Combine all ingredients in a small saucepan and heat, stirring, until melted together and thickened (6-8 minutes).

Life Saving Automatic Defibrillators

There are two defibrillators located within our parish, both for public use in an emergency.

- 1. Landulph Memorial Hall in Fore Street
- 2. Cargreen Yacht Club, Coombe Lane.

Landulph Memorial Hall defibrillator:

Located adjacent to front doors

To use you are required to input the code 1111 to unlock, and press the green 'tick' button to open for access.

Cargreen Yacht Club defibrillator

Located on the front wall of the building before you reach the front doors.

This unit is left unlocked, and so no unlock code is required.

Please remember in the event that you may need to use one of the above units, that in a cardiac arrest situation: **continuous CPR is essential while someone else goes to obtain the defibrillator.**
